Why Forklift Training is Necessary


- 100 fatalities each year
- 20,000 lost workday injuries annually
- Common injuries
 - Hitting a pedestrian
 - Tipping over
 - Improperly positioned loads
 - Falling from raised forks
 - Falling from a ladder struck with a forklift
 - Falling material
- OSHA estimates that approximately 77% of forklift accidents could have been prevented with proper training



OSHA Rules and Regulations

- Training is required by law. OSHA requires that all workers be trained and certified before driving a forklift, even if forklift driving is a very small part of their job.
- Training is proven to reduce accidents and injuries.
- All training and evaluation must be conducted by persons with the necessary knowledge, training, and experience to train powered industrial truck operators and evaluate their competence
 - A qualified trainer would be a person who by possession of a recognized degree, certificate, or professional standing, or.. "Who by extensive knowledge, training, and experience has demonstrated the ability to train and evaluate powered industrial truck operators."

OSHA Rules and Regulations

- Employers must certify that each operator has received the training and evaluate each operator at least once every three years.
- Prior to operating the truck in the workplace, the employer must evaluate the operator's performance and determine the operator to be competent to operate a powered industrial truck safely.
- Refresher training is needed whenever an operator demonstrates a deficiency in the safe operation of the truck.
- Training shall consist of a combination of formal instruction, practical training (demonstrations performed by the trainer and practical exercises performed by the trainee), and evaluation of the operator's performance in the workplace.
- [29 CFR 1910.178(I)(2)(ii)]



OSHA Rules and Regulations

- Per OSHA, it is a violation of Federal Law to operate a forklift without proper training and holding a valid forklift certification
 - Serious violations can cost a business
 \$13,653 per violation
 - Failure to abate violations can cost a business \$13,653 per day beyond the abatement date
 - Willful or repeated violations can COST a business \$136,532 per violation
